RPLA is the Florida Writers Association flagship writing competition.

Entries in 28 adult genre-categories and 5 youth genre-categories were accepted this year.

Our Rubrics

Customized for each of twenty-eight genre-categories. Ten genre-specific criteria with articulated standards. "Level Playing Field" approach.

- Designed by genre experts
- Reviewed annually

Our Judging Process

Two Preliminary Judges provide scores and constructive comments on Rubrics.

- Each criterion worth ten points, one hundred points total potential
- For book-length works, Judges read synopsis and first thirty pages
- For shorter works, Judges read entire work

Rubric Coordinators always ensure "P-I-E"

- P: Positive statements
- I: Improvement suggestions
- E: Examples and explanations

Third Preliminary Judge called in if first two scores fifteen or more points apart Semifinalist status (170 points combined) calls in Final Judge

- Reads entire work, regardless of length
- Score counts double

Finalist status (340 points total) qualifies for awards.

- Gold, Silver, Bronze for top three Finalists in each category
- Published and Unpublished awarded separately

Benefit to Entrants

Rubrics returned after Awards Ceremony.

If not an award winner and other qualifications are met, you may submit revised entries next year.





6) Write Tight: Omit Needless Words - Crystal Salon D

Good writing is about clarity. Clichés, grammatical errors, redundancies, oxymorons, and goofs of history and geography bog down your manuscript and stop the reader from turning the page. Learn to "kill your darlings" and write more powerful stories by omitting unnecessary words. **Eliot Kleinberg** spent a half century as a reporter, including 33-plus years at The Palm Beach Post. He's covered local news and written about Florida history. He produced two columns that ran in 22 Florida papers. He's co-founder of "Something Went Horribly Wrong," a blog about how to fix bad writing.

7) The Newspaper Pitch: Great Place for Freelance Opportunities – Crystal Salon E Freelance opportunities are plentiful if you know where to look. Although newspapers are struggling, they still seek out quality content, especially in local publications. Targeting the correct editors, making a good first impression are key to sustaining a freelance relationship. Increase your chances of success by turning a "no" into a "yes" when pitching to editors. Nafari Morris is a 17-year journalism veteran whose career began as an intern editor at the *Hartford Courant* and ended up with her own byline. Her weekly column for the *Pittsburgh Tribune-Review* won several local, state, and national awards. As a freelance writer, she's written for the *Washington Post* and other publications.

8) Writing Realistic Dialogue: Create Invisible Dialogue with Beats – Crystal Salon C Dialogue is how to move your story forward, so skip the dialogue tags to create a nuanced subtext. Write compelling dialogue integral to the scene and to the characters' voices with beats instead. Discover how using beats in dialogue can add conflict, drama, and tension while revealing your characters' true personalities. **Julie G. Murphy** holds an M.A. in Writing Popular Fiction from Seton Hill University. Her first book, *Flipping Rich Bastards*, published by Melange Books/Satin Romance, was voted 1st place in the Helen McCloy Mystery Writers of America Scholarship. She has also published a romance, *Western Knight*, and a YA utopic-thriller, *As If Something Happened*.

What advice do you have for members who wish to enter the RPLA next year?

Join a critique group. Share your writing with others for invaluable feedback to make your submission the best it can be.

What would you say is your interesting writing quirk?

I always know my ending. I write to a destination.

Where do you get your information or ideas for your books?

I write my nightmares.

What do you like to do when you're not writing?

Line dancing, playing Mah Jongg, and playing Samba (it's a card game).

What was one of the most surprising things you learned in creating your books?

Marketing has a life of its own, one I wish I didn't have to be involved in. But no one else is going to do it. So I'm it.

What suggestions do you have to help others become better writers?

Think of writing a story like making a lasagna. You start with your basic noodles, your basic idea. Then layer on the sauce, meat, cheese—the settings, descriptions, the characterizations. This is a huge casserole so keep working on those layers. Keep tweaking the recipe. Keep revising until it comes out the best it can be.

What do you think makes a good story?

Hit my emotions, whether it's a thrill, a chill, or a good cry.

What advice do you have for members who wish to enter the RPLA next year?

Make sure you've had your book edited. And don't underestimate your readers. They are smart, constantly questioning your characters, their motivations, and your plot. Write up to your readers. Challenge them.

What would you say is your interesting writing quirk?

I'm not sure about quirk, but I do find the use of hints of magical realism fascinating. There are perplexities in our everyday lives, and in my books, I just turn up the oddness to give the reader the occasional shiver.

What do you like to do when you're not writing?

I am also a painter, a watercolorist, drawing from my past as a professional ballet dancer for many of my figurative pieces.

What was one of the most surprising things you learned in creating your books?

I found it exhilarating to sit down each day with characters once they were imbued with life and agency. I also discovered that a shocking percentage of the success of a book has to do with its promotion—a job that falls in large part to the writer. So, gird up!

What suggestions do you have to help others become better writers?

Like a nice fragrance, if I read quality literature, I hope it is that it will cling to me.

What do you think makes a good story?

Writing characters who are compelling, interesting, surprising, perhaps, annoying, maybe, but no matter whether nice or nasty, with some characteristic that engages a reader is essential.

What do you like to do when you're not writing?


When is that? I love to spend time with my wife. I enjoy working with my writing groups and as the FWA Youth Chairperson. Helping others gives me a great feeling.





The Florida Writers Foundation, Inc. (FWF)


is a nonprofit corporation formed to promote literacy by enhancing writing skills in children, teens, and adults. We partner with existing programs and initiatives as well as developing new programs.

Educational Mission of FWF: The educational mission of the Florida Writers Foundation and financial grants for qualified organizations in Florida who engage in educational activities and projects that are compatible with the FWF mission. These organizations may include public or private

schools, PTAs, nonprofits, or other institutions whose projects and activities fit the parameters, values, and mission of the FWF. A sister organization of the Florida Writers Association (FWA), the two groups have many volunteers in common. FWF volunteers have made a difference in people's lives by visiting elementary schools for reading days, sponsoring poetry contests, donating books to schools, and contributing funds to promote school writing contests. We look forward to contributing funds to high school writing contests and visiting high schools. Florida Writers Association helps the FWF raise funds by hosting a silent auction during the annual Florida Writers Conference. Another fundraiser, the Florida Writers Foundation Celebrity Workshop, takes place right before the conference. Funds raised are designated for organizational grants.

<u>Educational Grant Program</u>: The FWF will determine the number of recipients of educational funds each year, and the amount of each award, based on the previous year's fundraising efforts with the understanding that the amount of available funds varies from year to year.

Qualifications & Requirements: The FWF will take a variety of factors into account when determining who to award grants to, and the amounts of the awards. Therefore, applicants should submit a packet that includes a cover letter, the appropriate application from the FWF website, and the requested documents.


